As I write to you, our students are in the midst of mid-term exams. During the school year, there are two different times when our schedule drastically changes. Mid-term exams and final exams are formal periods during which our students are expected to summarize their past semester or year-long learning. This time is preceded by a period of intensive review when students are asked to begin preparing for those exams that represent one-sixth of their final grade.

The Board of Education
 is inviting staff and community members to a public forum to meet Mr. D. Joseph Corr, our new Superintendent of Schools effective August 1, 2010, on either Thursday, February 11 at 7:00pm or Tuesday, February 23 at 7:00pm in the Shaker High School Media Center.

A great amount of time is used to set our testing and proctoring schedule for exams. The building is reorganized to allow for large group testing in the Taft cafeteria and F-Gym. Our double classrooms in J-wing are also used for testing. The special education department works to provide all special needs students with their Individualized Education Plan testing accommodations.

Advanced Placement Course Applications
 AP applications for 2009-2010 AP courses are due to the Supervisors' Office by March 8, 2010. Applications may be picked up in the Supervisors' Office.

I share this information as an introduction to why we hold such importance and invest so much time into these two testing periods. At Shaker High School it is understood that the vast majority of our students will go on to higher education. A smaller percentage of students will enter the military or the employment field. The overriding expectation for all of our students is that they be asked to demonstrate their knowledge through some form of assessment. In military service, college admission, employment and college, success is often predicated upon an individual's ability to score positively on various forms of examinations. During their time at Shaker High School, students understand the importance of our formal exam periods and the stakes they hold.

Final Exams and Regents Exams
Please note: In-class final exams will be held on June 3-10; school final exams will be held on June 1-23. Regents exams will be held from June 15-23. Exact dates and times for Regents Exams will be provided at a later date.

At Shaker High School recent graduates will often share with us their success in college, the military, or their career paths. They often link their success to their high school preparation. The benefit of outstanding instruction coupled with students' understanding of expectations of their learning environment are often two reasons for their post high school success.

Academic Intervention Services (AIS)
 There will be a number of students who have schedule changes based on results of state and school assessments taken during mid-term week. Students who did not pass Regents exams will be scheduled for lab classes designed to prepare them to pass that particular Regents exam. This is a mandated requirement due to the State Education Department's regulations. This remediation program is known as Academic Intervention Services. Students who failed mid-term exams in specific subjects may also be scheduled into lab classes. If your child has had his/her schedule changed due to AIS, and you have questions, please contact the appropriate academic supervisor.

Programming for 2010-2011
 Mid-year examinations have been completed. Now that the second semester is beginning, it is time to start the program planning and course selection process for the 2010-2011 school year. This process is essential for each student and will require considerable time and thought. Parents and students are encouraged to work closely with counselors, teachers, supervisors, and hall principals during the programming and course selection process. Phase I will conclude during the last week of April. Preliminary enrollment counts from this phase will be used to confirm faculty staffing needs for 2010-2011. They will also be used to identify courses which will or will not be taught in the coming year. Therefore, it is imperative that students select the courses in which they wish to enroll for the coming school year during Phase I.

The second phase begins May 17 and ends the first of July. This time period should be used to review, verify, and if necessary, change course selections. It is essential that the July 1 deadline for all course selection changes be observed because after that date the procedures for completing the Shaker High School master schedule will have begun. After July 1, course change requests will only be made under unusual circumstances.

During the second semester, two important parent/student meetings will be held. The first is the Eleventh Grade Parent/Student Night, which is scheduled for March 3. The second is the Eighth Grade Parent/Student Night scheduled for March 18. I am using this opportunity as a reminder that your involvement and support in the programming and course selection process is essential to your child's success at Shaker High School. Please carefully review all of the available options and recommendations so that your child's final request will challenge them, as well as meet their future objectives. Remember school personnel are available to assist you during each phase of the programming course selection process.

Expectations

We are continuing our efforts to decrease the number of student tardies, improve the appearance of our building and grounds, and help Shaker students exercise self-discipline, make good judgments, and take reasonable responsibility for their own education. We are making progress in most of these areas, but we need your help, commitment, and support to meet these objectives. In addition to the academic preparation that your children receive at Shaker High School, they also must demonstrate that they can respect themselves, their peers, school personnel, and private property. In addition, they must come to school every day and report to homeroom and classes on time. These and other important responsibilities can be discharged appropriately if students, parents, and school personnel work collaboratively.

Art/Music News

Two Shaker High School art students, Victoria Wittermann and Kelly Bouchard, will have artwork on display at the New York State Art Teachers Association Legislative Exhibit held at the NYS Capitol's Legislative Building. A reception of local legislators and young artists will be held on February 23rd from 12:30-2:00pm.

The Art Department is proud to feature an exhibit of student work in the Gallery celebrated with a reception on Thursday, March 4, 2010 at 7:00 pm. The artwork will represent a range of courses within the department. We encourage you to attend the reception and/or stop in to view the exhibit.

The high school art faculty is in the process of selecting our highest quality student art work for the annual Regional Juried Art Exhibit. This year the exhibit will be held at Proctor's in Schenectady in their Fenimore Asset Gallery and Albany International Room. The reception will coincide with the Schenectady Art Night on Friday, April 16th.

Similarly, student graphic design and film creations are being considered for submission to the annual Capital Region Media Arts Festival, which will be held at Niskayuna HS on March 25th.

We look forward to a strong collection of artwork representing Shaker High School in both events.

*Student Withdrawal and Re-enrollment
Guidelines for Shaker High School*

When a student withdraws from Shaker High School, the student is officially no longer enrolled in the school. The student will be provided with the necessary information to facilitate his/her transfer to a new school. However, it should be understood that if a student re-enrolls at Shaker High School, he/she remains withdrawn and Shaker is not responsible for supplying course curricula, outlines, assignment sheets, texts, assessments, or any other additional work related to courses from which the student has withdrawn. It is the responsibility of parents, students, and counselor at the new school to choose the most appropriate and best matched courses to insure as smooth a transition as possible in the student's academic work.

The decision to withdraw a child from Shaker High School and re-enroll that same student later in the school year often results in academic difficulties, such as non-aligned curricula and inadequate preparation for current Shaker course topics. Upon the student's return, he/she may require after-school help, private tutoring, or, in some cases, attendance at summer school at the discretion of the supervisor, or may be required to repeat the course during the following school year.

Media Center News

As the second half of the 2009-2010 school year approaches, the Library Media Specialists are planning for the busiest time of year in the Media Center. Many Shaker students will complete a comprehensive research project during the third quarter of the school year. Most of the students will carry out this project as part of their English class; however, Social Studies, Science, Health and FACS classes will also visit the Media Center to conduct research.

Students increasingly rely on electronic resources to conduct research. With that in mind, the Media Specialists will pre-select appropriate Internet sites based on the particular assignment. These pre-selected sites are then consolidated into a web page and housed, under the classroom teacher's name, at the Shaker High School Library Home Page. Students access these resources by clicking the Teacher Web Sites link on the SHS library page. This resource is available on any computer, in or out of school, with Internet access.

While at home and at school, students also have access to a wide variety of electronic database resources. These database products are selected for subscription purchase based on their correlation to the Shaker High School curriculum. The SHS collection of database resources provides relevant and timely material in the areas of history, literature, science, health, art, and social issues. There are also several general news and reference databases. These are subscription databases; therefore, usernames and passwords are necessary in order to access the material out of the high school building. Please be sure your SHS student has the 2009-2010 brochure for the Shaker High School databases.

School Board Officer and Employee Code of Ethics

Please be informed that the Board of Education approved to amend Policy No. 2160, School Board Officer & Employee Code of Ethics. A component of this policy states that all of our employees shall abide by the clause noted below regarding the acceptance of gifts.

Gifts: He/she shall not directly or indirectly, solicit any gift; or accept or receive any gift annually having a value of seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars or more, from an individual, family, or company, whether in the form of money, services, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or any other form, under circumstances in which it could reasonably be inferred that the gift was intended to influence him/her or could reasonably be expected to influence him/her, in the performance of his/her official duties or was intended as a reward for any official action on his/her part.

Source: This provision is part of the statutory code, applicable to all municipalities (General Municipal Law, 805-a, (1))

Essentially, this means that no employee shall receive, annually, any gift(s) having a value of \$75.00 or more from an individual, family or company.

Shaker High School Alumni Hall of Fame Nominate Shaker High School's Finest Alumni

Shaker High School has many outstanding alumni whose lives bring credit to the North Colonie Central School District. Last year, in conjunction with the 50th anniversary of Shaker High School, we established the Shaker High School Alumni Hall of Fame as a way to recognize and honor those alumni who have excelled in their fields of endeavor and contributed significantly to the lives of others. In our inaugural group, we inducted Dr. F. Scott Regan, class of 1965, Colonel Edward Daly, class of 1974, Mr. Joseph Finder, class of 1976, and Governor Kevin Warsh, class of 1988.

This year, as we look to expand our group of honorees, we seek nominations for our Hall of Fame. We believe members of the Hall of Fame are role models who can inspire our students to continue the tradition of excellence which defines the North Colonie community.

To be considered as a candidate for the Shaker High School Alumni Hall of Fame, an alumnus must:

- be a graduate of Shaker High School
- have graduated from Shaker High School at least five years prior to the nomination
